Jake Edwards is an Onondaga Nation Chief who works on a variety of environmental issues on behalf of his Nation.

Henry Lickers

Henry Lickers (Seneca, Turtle Clan) is the environmental coordinator for the Mohawk Council of Akwasasne. A biologist, Henry has worked closely with the Onondaga Nation in developing their "Vision for a Clean Onondaga Lake." Since 1976, Lickers has advocated for raising awareness of the negative affects to human health and health of the environment from contamination at Akwesasne. In 2006, Lickers received the Jean Woodsworth Award, which is awarded annually by Canadian Pensioner Concerned Inc. Ontario Division, to an environmental professional who



dedicates time to the community and the environment working for a caring compassionate society. He has recently been appointed as scientist-at-large with the Canadian Model Forest Network.
