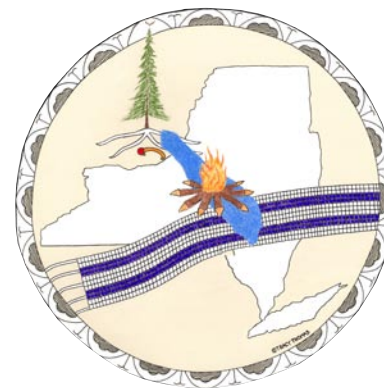

Denise is the co-founder of the Onondaga Nation Higher Education committee as well as a consultant for Onondaga Nation Communications. Denise has worked on various international and global projects for the Haudenosaunee International Delegation, such as UNCED, Working Group on Indigenous Peoples and the Human Rights Declaration on Indigenous Peoples. Denise brings her wealth of traditional Haudenosaunee knowledge into her

classroom and throughout the curriculum which she has written and developed for the elementary level. Denise resides on the Onondaga Nation. Her father, the late Chief Paul Waterman was a traditional Onondaga Nation Council member for nearly fifty years.

Helen Slottje is a public interest attorney from Ithaca. She is an active member of Shaleshock, a movement that works toward protecting our communities and environment from exploitative gas drilling in the Marcellus Shale region.
