AMEN. In one of the most statesman-like addresses of the last decade Secretary of
State Cordell Hull at Buenos Aires emphasized the responsibility of each nation "care-
fully to educate and organize its people in opposition to war." "The peoples of the
world would be far wiser", he said, "if they expended more of their hard-earned money
in organizing the forces of peace and fewer of the present five billion dollars in
equipping and training their military forces."
