

HEARD AT ANTI-WAR RALLY IN NEW YORK CITY

NORMAN THOMAS (Socialist Presidential Candidate) charged both President Roosevelt and Mr. Willkie with equal willingness to "gamble the lives and fortunes of 132 million people . . . Rarely have any people been so deliberately panicked into hysteria and fooled into possible wars of aggression in the name of defense as have the American people. . . . If we allow ourselves to be dragged into a war in the Far East it will be the most unnecessary, the most insane, the most terrible war the world has ever known."

RABBI SIDNEY E. GOLDSTEIN (of the Free Synagogue:) "If we are to prevent international conflicts which will destroy civilization as we know it, we must reorganize our entire economic and political life."

DR. PHILLIPPS P. ELLIOTT (Brooklyn Presbyterian Pastor;) calling for the maintenance of peace without military victory, said, "War is the antithesis of everything religion believes . . . You can have one or the other, but not both. We are vitally interested in defense . . . but we are more interested in the defense of peace."

DR. EVAN THOMAS (World War I Conscientious Objector) " . . . No event in history has made me believe that we can accomplish our ends (democracy) through the means of force . . . No Hitler could win out against non-cooperation."

MERCHANTS OF DEATH, 1940. Among those corporations reporting profits for the first half of 1940, five have a net gain of 197.8% over the same period last year. Republic Steel tops the list with 495.3%; others are Atlantic Refining Co. 289%; Libby-Owens-Ford Glass, 94.9%; General Electric 58%; Caterpillar Tractor 51.5%. Four hundred leading corporations report gains of 58.6%. (Figures are from the Congressional Record, August 29, 1940.) On the other hand, payrolls rose only 13%, according to Department of Labor figures.

EUROPEAN RELIEF. Millions of civilians, particularly women and children, are facing starvation and epidemics this winter. The American Friends' Service Committee is collecting food and clothing for children's homes, hospitals and feeding centers in France. NEWS FROM BRITAIN. London, August 29, 1940.
"Never, I suppose, has the sum total of civilian courage in this country proved so great as it is today," writes Vera Brittain in her LETTER TO PEACE LOVERS. After describing the "magnificent heroism" and "superlative courage" of civilians and soldiers in the total war phase which England is now undergoing, she asks, "For what end are these great sacrifices being made? Our finest qualities are demanded of us in order that grief, terror and despair may be inflicted not only upon a hostile government, but upon the people who accepted it. The outcome of our nobility can only be their greater suffering, their more prolonged ordeal ... Suppose that the crusading courage ... were harnessed to the imaginative construction of friendly international relationships based on mutual sacrifice and cooperative good will? Imagine what would happen if they were dedicated to revitalizing the Church, rebuilding the slums, reinvigorating literature, music and art, reorganizing from top to bottom the economic system based on privilege and power, tackling the vexed problem of distribution, making equal education and opportunities available for all

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
